


## Safety & Security Meeting Purpose



### Discipline Data Definitions


- School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting (SESIR) grew out of the public's concern that children be safe in the school environment. In 1995-96 in response to this concern, the SESIR system was initiated to enable schools to track incidents and analyze patterns of violent, criminal or disruptive activity. The intent is for there to be complete and objective data from which to design interventions to improve the learning environment.




## Hagerty-Oviedo Cluster: Elementary 2022 Q1-Q3 Number of Referrals and Unique Students








## Hagerty-Oviedo Cluster: Secondary 2022 Q1-Q3 Number of Referrals and Unique Students





## School Resources



## School Resources

**School Counselors**: School Counselors can help refer students to appropriate internal and community resources. They are also available for crisis intervention and support.

**School Psychologists:** School psychologists provide direct support and interventions to students, consult with teachers, families, and other school-employed mental health professionals (i.e., school counselors, school social workers) to improve support strategies, work with school administrators to improve school-wide practices and policies, and collaborate with community providers to coordinate needed services.

**School Social Workers:** School social workers can assist a family in accessing community resources for a variety of needs including housing, food, clothing, and medical needs. They are able to meet with students one-on-one or in groups to provide counseling services related to educational goals.

**District Mental Health Counselors**: The District Mental Health Counselors are available to help family's navigate mental health needs including connecting families to mental health supports in the community. They are also available to provide one-on-one counseling for students who are appropriate for school-based services.











## Threats reported 1st 3 Quarters of 2021-2022

#### School Level



#### Substantive vs. Transient



Transient: Threat to harm as an expression of anger or frustration that can be easily/quickly resolved

Substantive: More serious in nature with some intent to do harm and/or means/plan to carry it out
