


Safety & Security Meeting Purpose



Discipline Data Definitions

- School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting (SESIR) grew out of the public's concern that children be safe in the school environment. In 1995-96 in response to this concern, the SESIR system was initiated to enable schools to track incidents and analyze patterns of violent, criminal or disruptive activity. The intent is for there to be complete and objective data from which to design interventions to improve the learning environment.








Lake Brantley Cluster: Secondary 2022 Q1-Q3 Number of Referrals and Unique Students

District: Secondary 2022 Q1-Q3 Number of Referrals and Unique Students






Top Ten Referrals




District: Elementary 2022 Q1-Q3 Top 10 Referrals and Unique Students






Lake Brantley Cluster: Secondary 2022 Q1-Q3 Top 10 Referrals and Unique Students






District: Secondary 2022 Q1-Q3 Top 10 Referrals and Unique Students





School Resources



School Resources

School Counselors: School Counselors can help refer students to appropriate internal and community resources. They are also available for crisis intervention and support.

School Psychologists: School psychologists provide direct support and interventions to students, consult with teachers, families, and other school-employed mental health professionals (i.e., school counselors, school social workers) to improve support strategies, work with school administrators to improve school-wide practices and policies, and collaborate with community providers to coordinate needed services.

School Social Workers: School social workers can assist a family in accessing community resources for a variety of needs including housing, food, clothing, and medical needs. They also are able to meet with students one on one or in groups to provide counseling services related to educational goals.

District Mental Health Counselors: The District Mental Health Counselors are available to help family's navigate mental health needs including connecting families to mental health supports in the community. They are also available to provide one on one counseling for students who are appropriate for school-based services.


Threat Procedure







Reported Threats 1st 3 Quarters









Threats reported 1st 3 Quarters of 2021-2022

Substantive vs. Transient



Transient- threat to harm as an expression of anger or frustration that can be easily/quickly resolved.

Substantive- More serious in nature with some intent to do harm and/or means/plan to carry it out.

"Some kids don't think schools are ready for an emergency. Are we ready for a real emergency?"

Mental Health Tiers

Three Tiers- how do we determine?

- How deeply are the symptoms affecting the student?
- How many settings are they experiencing a disruption in?

Home, Academic, Extracurriculars, Relationships, etc.

How pervasive are the symptoms/effects?
 Intensity/Amount/Duration



"What would make students feel more connected to the adults on campus?"

"32% of the secondary students that took the survey do not think that they have an adult on campus to talk to, and that makes me sad."

What measures can schools take to assist students in finding a trusted adult they could talk to, if needed?

"How can we gain improvement for parent participation on the survey?"

"Not a lot of parent participation."
